The LAFF Society is neither endorsed or encouraged by the Foundation, but high officials there have complimented us on our efforts to keep in touch with friends and wish us well.

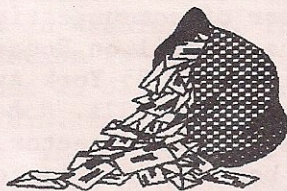

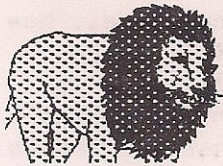

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Foundation to Foundation

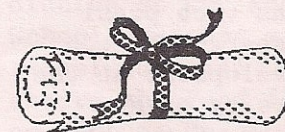
Several alumni have gone on to become

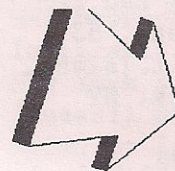

A bit more than half of the FF Alumni whose names and addresses we could find have responded affirmatively -- in many cases enthusiastically -- to our opening salvo. I made a New Year's resolution not to join another organization (however loose and easy) without resigning from one. You have sorely tested me, but..."

Booked Up

Having funded the writing of many books during their Ford Foundation years, many former staff members, it comes as no surprise, write books of their own after they leave. Those we know of to date are:

"Rediscovering America: Journeys Through Our Forgotten Past" (Houghton Mifflin, 1991), by **Roger G. Kennedy** (Arts, 1979), called "highly civilized and readable" by the *Times Literary Supplement*. Kennedy, who became and remains director of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History, also wrote "Architecture, Men, Women and Money in America, 1600-1860" (Random House 1985) and "Greek Revival America" (Stewart, Tabori and Chang 1989).

"Danger and Survival: The Political History of the Nuclear Weapon" (Random House, 1988) by **McGeorge Bundy** (president, 1979) a widely praised work that landed on the first page of *The New York Times Book Review*. After serving as professor of history at New York University, Bundy now is at Carnegie Corporation as chair of its Task Force

on the Nuclear Threat.

"New People in Old Neighborhoods: The Role of Immigrants in Rejuvenating New York's Communities" (Russell Sage Foundation 1990) by **Louis Winnick** (National Affairs, 1986). Until 1989 he was a Senior Fellow at the New School and has since been a senior consultant to the Fund for the City of New York, 121 Sixth Ave., New York, NY 10013.

"The Music Came From Deep Inside," about artists and severely handicapped kids (Brookline Books), by **Junius Eddy** (Arts, 1973). Eddy worked for a few years on Rockefeller Foundation arts education projects. He moved to Rhode Island in 1975, where he has done pro bono work in the arts and environmental and education matters and consulting for such enterprises as Foxfire. "The Moscow Correspondents" by **Whitman Bassow** (Reports), a prize-winning history of American reporting on Russia from the Revolution to glasnost. (William Morrow, 1988). He recently completed the manuscript of a book on Indonesia, 36 Benedict Pl., Pelham, NY 10803.
